Saturday 6th July

Trip: Cotswolds and Stratford-upon-Avon. Our day begins at **9.00 AM**, convening at Campus reception, eagerly embarking on an expedition through England's exquisite countryside and the hallowed grounds of literary lore. The day concludes with a return to Birmingham at 17.00, wrapping up a day full of picturesque landscapes, charming villages, and immersive literary history. This memorable journey through the Cotswolds and Stratford-upon-Avon is sure to leave a lasting impression.

Our journey starts at **10:30 am at the campus reception** for students residing on-site, and at **11:00 am at the historic "The Bull"** in the City Centre for those staying with host families. At the Black Country Museum, you'll traverse 26 acres of meticulously reconstructed shops, pubs, and houses, all reminiscent of what the region would have looked like during the height of the industrial era. Saturday 13th July

Trip: Liverpool and Chester (by coach). Join us for an awe-inspiring day trip to the lively city of Liverpool and the medieval gem, Chester. **We meet at the Campus at 8.30 am** to kick off our expedition. We understand that the British Culture and its traditions are different from yours, that's why we suggest you get the best out of this experience and try to approach British people with a positive attitude. On the other side, you may find that people in the UK are not familiar with your culture and will not understand your needs unless you explain them. Do not be afraid to tell teachers, your host family, or new friends if you have particular needs. If you tell people the reasons, they will understand much better, and they will surely enjoy finding out about the differences between our cultures.

England has always been inclusive with people of different nationalities. You will be in contact with different foreign languages, religions, eating habits, clothing, and so on.

Remember that Birmingham is the second largest city in England, it is generally a safe place to live. However, there can be problems in certain areas, so you should follow some sensible guidelines:

- Never carry large amounts of cash.
- Avoid dark and lonely streets and subways.
- Avoid walking anywhere on your own at night.

IMPORTANT RULES

Your Host Family

- You must return to your homestay at the agreed time in the evening. If you are going to be late, you must contact the host family and obtain their permission.
- If you go out in the evening or at the weekend, you must tell your host family where you are going, who you are going with and what time you will return.
You must always be home by 10pm. No overnight stays are permitted.
- Make sure that your host family knows your mobile number and keep your phone turned on at all times.

Student Home accommodation

- If you are accommodated in a student home, you will be assigned a tutor who will act as your supervisor and will live in the same premises.
- During your stay you will have to comply with the instruction of the tutor, otherwise measures will be taken that could lead, in the most serious cases, to early repatriation.
- The tutor is available 24/7 and their contact number will be provided to you.
- If you have written permission from your parent/guardians to travel independently in the city, you may do so, but you need to be at the student accommodation before 10pm and you need to inform your tutor about your whereabouts.
- If you DON'T have written permission from your parent/guardians to travel independently in the city, after your Class in College you need to report to International Office and outside the College you must be under the supervision of the tutor all time;
- If you are part of an organized group, you must comply with the instruction of your accompanying teacher and the College tutor all the time.

Important information about UK Law

- You cannot buy or drink alcohol if you are under 18.
- You cannot buy tobacco or cigarettes if you are under 18.
- It is illegal to carry or take drugs. If somebody offers you drugs, always say no.
- It is a crime to ask someone over 18 to buy alcohol and tobacco for you.
